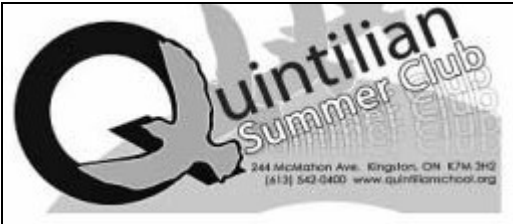
KINGSTON'S ADHD PARENT SUPPORT GROUP

PRESIDENT' S REPORT

We have made it through another winter and all of us are stronger for it, I'm sure. Coming into spring we have buds, blooms and our 2014 Annual General meeting. Always a time for reflection, we look to activities, community contacts, our volunteer base, and future plans for our chapter. It has been a busy year with a move for more efficient quarters, within the same complex, but more in keeping with our budget. We have spent time building awareness and contacts within the community, as well as seeking sustainable funding. As an organization dependent on donations, with no secured sustainable funding, this has taken considerable energy. We have continued now for a second year, to have a small but regular fund through our work with the Community Spirit Bingo, for which we are grateful. Funds from this fundraising activity are to be dedicated to outreach activities for LDAK within our community and will help us, in part, to continue offering our Learning = Power workshops, as well as other educational opportunities. We have built our reputation on our educational programming and our ability to connect people to resources, and that continues to be strong.

Community members have found us, and we had a total of 415 individual community contacts, and of that 74 were first time connections to LDAK. The vast majority of those contacts were for general information about learning disabilities and services we can offer, information about our resource library, and about prospects for tutors and other community supports available. Other organizations have been requesting collaborations. We had another year of activity with the Queen's Commerce students on the Board Leadership program and we say goodbye to one year and hello to another with several new and committed board members.

Looking to next year and future activities, I say a fond farewell to the President's position and pass this to Gail Eaton-Smith with confidence in her passion, understanding of LD issues, her great ideas and leadership. I will remain as past-president and I am sure I will always have something to contribute or at least something to which I can add my comments. I believe that our success as an organization will depend on the technology we promote to have adapted for our community contacts. LDA Ontario has recently had success with a provincial webinar/workshop for parents and the technological format may be the ticket for our promotion and awareness for those individuals in our community we have yet to meet, who could certainly use our support. So I look forward to this possibility with a new proposal we have put forward for assistive technology workshops, support materials and on-line resources. The way of the future is really the way we have supported our individuals for years – simply following what we know.

I have also noticed over the years our influence and contributions to the Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC), a standing committee of the school boards, where it is acknowledged that almost 50% of identified children with special needs have a learning disability. The SEAC at the Limestone District School Board has just committed to a plan of advocacy and community engagement that clearly aligns with LDAK. I am excited to witness new inroads into special education supports for people in our community who are living with a learning disability, and I encourage everyone to join me in body and spirit – call our office and see how you can help.
